Irish Heritage On Display In The Old Mint Bank Vault

THE UNITED IRISH CULTURAL Center's Keepers of the Steps program opened their latest exhibition to great acclaim and fanfare aptly on Leap Day and on the eve of Irish American Heritage Month—February 29, 2024. The exhibit entitled, Irish Dance—Celebrating the Roots, Rhythms, and Rituals of the San Francisco Irish is a special collaboration with the San Francisco Historical Society and is housed in the lower level of their museum located in the original SF Mint in the heart of the Financial District. The special exhibit explores how Irish dancing has fostered community and celebrated culture since the city's inception, with stories, images, and ephemera going back to the Gold Rush days some of which are serendipitously displayed in a bank vault from that era!

The Opening Night Reception drew a healthy crowd of people both new and familiar with Irish Dance, which is one of the goals of the program. As UICC Vice President and "Keepers" Committee Co-Chair Anne Cassidy Carew shared in her opening remarks, "San Francisco is a small city, and even smaller in the dance world. These are the stories that connect us and keep our heritage

scored its important role in the Irish diaspora. The Consulate, which facilitates grant applications for the Government of Ireland's Emigrant Support Programme—of which the Keepers of the Steps program is a beneficiary—remarked on the impressive rate of growth of the program. The committee attributes this to an unmet need. Organizers say, "There is very little written about the history of Irish dance, and so it is incumbent upon us to record these stories—and with a sense of urgency before stories are lost."

The keynote was an animated and inspired address

from Captain Jack Hart of the SFPD who shared his own Irish dance story in the context of embracing his proud Irish heritage and how it has shaped his life. He delighted the crowd with his personal accounts, a quick song reminiscent of his dancing days with the Murphy School of Irish Dance at the Ethic Dance Festival, and concluded with a quick, and rousing step or two—spry as ever!

The evening was marked

by fine entertainment from the Boyle Irish Dance Academy—instructor Noreen Boyle Heavey, TCRG is a member of the Keepers committee and brought some dancers to add to the evening along with San Francisco's newest Rose, Maggie Baglin on pipes.

The 100 gathered guests had plenty of time to take in the exhibit and view the dress collection in the old bank vault. Stories were exchanged, memories made—and shared! Irish Dance has touched so many lives over so many decades—the theme alone provides a common ground and connects us all. The Keepers of the Steps Exhibition will be on display at the San Francisco Historical Society Museum, 608 Commercial Street, in San Francisco's Financial District through May 2024. The Museum hours are Thursday-Saturday 10 am-4 pm—the historic building alone is worth a look. And while you are there, you'll find that the Irish Dance history exhibition pairs nicely with the SF Historical Society's concurrent exhibit featuring the Museum of Performance and Design's, San Francisco On Stage with historical artifacts from the SF Ballet and Opera.
